Emerald Bay

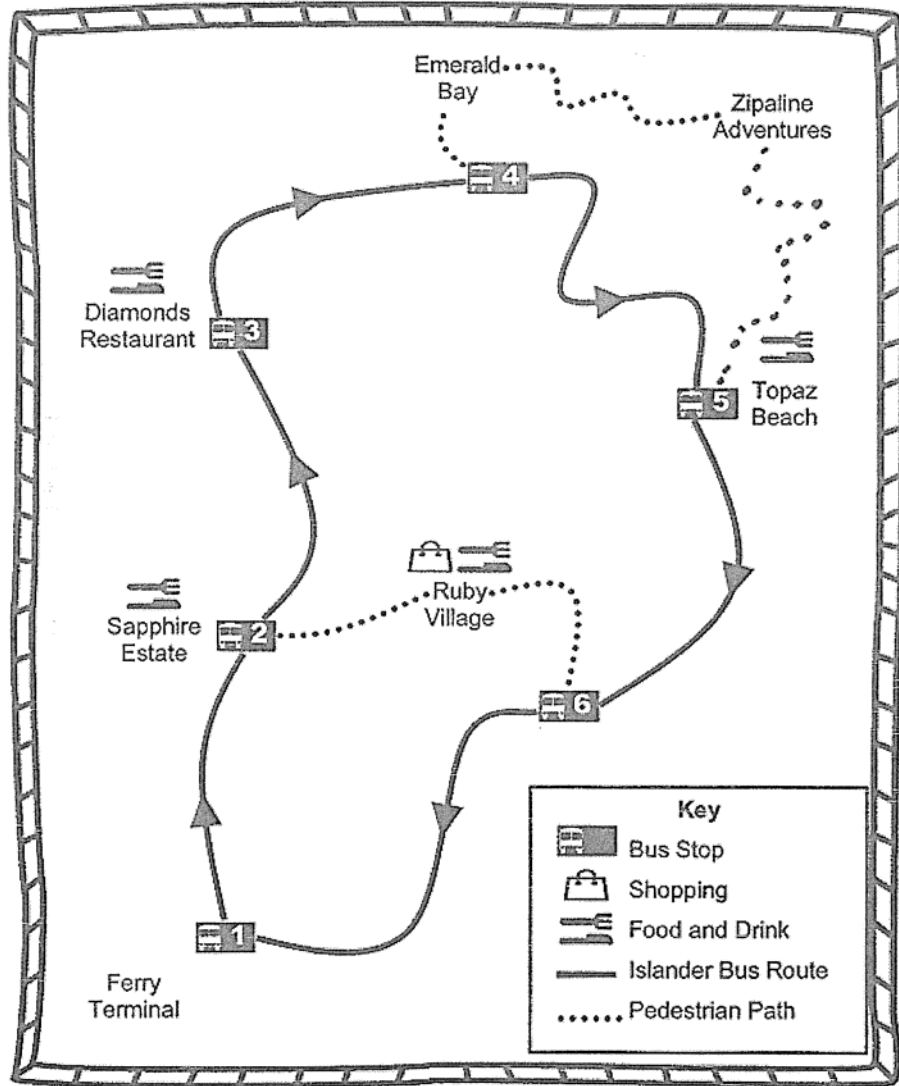
Head north and enjoy breathtaking views of the sea! The cliff walk can be done in an hour or two and takes you past fascinating rock formations.

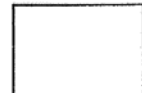

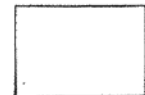

We have cared for our sick and injured for thousands of years, though not always by trained personnel until recent years. Have you ever wondered how the profession of nursing came (51) _____?

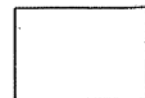

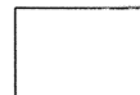

Shielding himself as best he could from the downpour, Martin dashed across the street towards a row of conservation shophouses in Singapore's historical neighbourhood. By the time he reached shelter, his shoes and bag were drenched. Yet, he refused to let the dampness hinder him during his day of self-exploration.

Martin had been living in London since his early twenties. The busyness of life took over and the last time he set foot in Singapore was eight years ago, when his sister, Marion, had given birth to Anne. He was back this time, indefinitely, for he had been fired from his company in London. Immediately, Martin was chauffeured around by Marion who sensed his woe and persisted in forcing him to visit relatives and see the latest sights. Martin was grateful for the distraction as being surrounded by family and a new environment eased the gloom that he was feeling. However, he longed to walk the city streets alone and reconnect with Singapore face-to-face, instead of looking through the windows of his sister's car.

An opportunity came knocking when Marion suddenly had urgent errands to run so Martin jumped at the chance to spend the day out by himself. He deliberately made his way to the older parts of town to see if he could still recognise the streets that he used to roam as a child with his father. He was rather taken aback as many shophouses had been refurbished into boutique offices or restaurants. Some of the transformations made rendered the shophouses unrecognisable. There was little left of the old-world charm that he remembered.

Continuing his exploration when the rain finally stopped, Martin came upon a traditional *kopitiam*, dialect for coffeehouse, seemingly forgotten by time. Dim bulbs hung from the ceiling while dusty fans swivelled from side to side, doing their best to shift the humid air. The walls and furniture were chipped and the floors were grimy. In spite of the squalor, Martin felt drawn to this old-style coffeehouse. It was unpretentious and casual, welcoming all who wanted to have a meal or simply take a break, much unlike the unnecessary rigidity and coldness of some modern food courts that served generic fare prepared by disinterested cooks.
